erans Affairs committees, concluding the Washington Conference. During his testimony, National Commander Troiola cited the 'Be the One' initiative – to raise awareness and destigmatize asking for help – as "our organization's highest priority today." Together, we can be the difference in ending veteran suicide. Helping to 'Be the One' leads to healthy families and communities.

The grassroots efforts of posts within their community are vital to The American Legion's success and have a critical role in supporting and strengthening our organization. One such example culminated last month in National Commander Troiola's testimony. Data collected from *Consolidated Post Reports* from across the nation construct the report to Congress of our significant accomplishments in the programs we delivered over the past year.

It is not too early to ensure your Consolidated Post Report inputs are current to date, then focus on finishing the year strong and getting the year-ending report submitted on time. We should have a 100% submission rate for all posts every year!

Putting together our Proposed 2022 -2023 Budget for our Department of Oregon is serious business. We are a business. Some difficult decisions had to be made. It is our responsibility to come up with a balanced budget to present to you, our members, and your delegates to our Department Convention in June for adoption. This Proposed Budget will be presented before our Department Convention to your District Commanders and Department Officers at our Spring DEC in Redmond, then be published in the Legionnaire for all members and presented to the Department Convention Finance Committee at Convention, and then presented to your Post Delegates to our Department Convention at the Mill Casino in North Bend.

The Post Delegates will cast their vote for adoption. This is required by our Department Constitution and By-Laws. Our Department Budget Year is October 1 through September 30. This is also our Department Tax Year which is being submitted now. Lower membership does affect our Department Budget and what we are able to do to complete our mission and our commitments to our Members and Veterans Community. Our plan for our 2021-2022 Department Budget was for increased membership and matching funds to offset our shortfall, as agreed in our Spring DEC and Department Convention. We have not accomplished that requirement in our plan.

We had to revisit our budget, which we do monthly throughout the Budget year, which is part of that plan. We cannot have a negative budget. As we put this Proposed 2022-2023 Department Budget together, we were required to reduce our Membership income to support our actuals and make further reductions in expenses. We need to work on our membership. There are plenty of opportunities in

our Department for growth. Several Posts are active again and doing programs, doing a good job for their members and commu-



nities, and PDC, Bob Huff holding Department Finance Officer events. All of us must work together as a team to turn this around. We have done it before and been very successful. "Tace-et-Face."



Remember, for those Posts with a Tax Year of January 1 to December 31. It is time to get your financial information

in order and file your 990-N, 990EZ, or 990 Tax Form. Remember, there are no exceptions. The IRS system has gone live.

Remember, the Oregon American Legion Foundation is a 501©3 and is there. Contributions are tax-deductible, and funds are used for our programs. There is a lot of information and grant requests on our Web Site. Department Program Chairs, there are grants available for most of our programs. All you must do is apply for them, and many grants are available. We have our Foundation, which is a 501c3 which the grants can be made out and earmarked for your Program.

It has been a hectic month be tween n fighting with Mother Nature and the Department Revitalization that happened at Tillamook Post in March. They now have





The SAL is made up of our sons and grandsons. Some SAL members are dual members, meaning they are post

members and SAL members. Their purpose is to work alongside the post members. The post members should guide the SAL members but should not be controlling. The members of the SAL need to remember they need to work with the Post on legion programs and help with post activities; being a Program of the Post, the Post has the final say on what the squadrons do. The post members decide whether they want a Squadron or not. I hope the post leadership realizes the value of having a squadron and will work with them to make the squadron and post a better place for all. As I have stated," the SAL is here to work with you, not for you." The post leadership should not stifle the squadrons but allow them to work independently in fundraising for their projects. and **Posts** Districts will be having elections for new officers. As you may already know, the Depart-RICHARD RAMEY

ment of Oregon INTERNAL AFFAIRS CHAIR Constitution By-Laws calls for "Each Post shall elect its officers for the ensuing year not less than forty-five (45) days prior to the Department Convention" (Art. II, Sec. 3.). That would mean that all elections would be held prior to April 30, 2023.

So, what are some of the other requirements that should be considered in preparation for elections?

Department Ad-**Elections** jutant shall issue to each Post not less than 60 days prior to Convention (April 15) the number of delegates and alternates each Post is entitled to Convention. (Const. Art. V. Sec. 4)

Each Post shall have the following Post officers; Commander, one or more Vice Commanders, Adjutant, Finance Officer, Chaplain, and Service Officer (By-Laws Art. II, Sec. 2.). These are elected, except for those that the Post Constitution and By-Laws designate as appointed.

Each District shall select a District Commander, one or more Vice Commanders, a District Adjutant, and such other elective or appointive officers as the District may determine at a meeting following the spring Department Executive Committee meeting,

said meeting to be received at Department Headquarters no later than 20 days prior to the opening of the Department Convention (May 26). Voting shall be any method determined by the District; however, Posts will vote at convention delegate strength (By-Laws, Art. I, Sec. 2). (Note: District officers must have a copy of their documentation showing eligibility to belong to the American Legion [i.e., DD214 or equivalent) on file at Department. Also, the District meeting minutes at which they were elected must be on file at Department.)

Any meetings must have a quorum of members, as designated by the Post/District Constitution and By-Laws, to conduct business for which a vote is required.

If only one person is nominated, then that person can be elected by "acclamation". (A vote is still required, after which they are declared elected by acclamation.)

During elections, the person presiding over the election for that officer position must be someone other than the person nominated for the position. So, if the Commander presides over the meeting and he/she is nominated for the Commander position, then a Vice Commander should preside over the election for that position. Then, after the election, the Commander can resume presiding over the elections for any other officer position elections.

Any nominations for elections must be seconded prior to voting.

All election results must be recorded in the minutes, including the person elected and the position for which they were elected.

All meetings should include a signin of members for the record.

Delegates to the Convention should be voted upon.

Forms for documenting elections can be found on the Department website.

2nd Vice Commander Dan Burks, Ann Everetts, and PDC Bob Huff, Chair. The focus of the Commission is oversight over VA&R activities for our Department. We still have an opportunity for another Legionnaire in good standing to join our team. If you are interested in joining or participating with this elite team and being part of our future supporting Veterans and families in our Department, don't hesitate to get in touch with us. Our Commission has held virtual Zoom meetings, and we are scheduling another now as we are getting busy with increased activity to support our Veterans and their families. With discussion on the staffing of the Veterans Benefits Office in Portland and looking at the outcomes before COVID-19, we are changing our strategy, and we will be having discussions in our Commission. We have scheduled Veteran Service Officers to do outreach and be present at all our Department events and support our District and Post events. If your Post or District is scheduling a Veterans Stand-Down, Employment, Education or Benefits event, or Revitalization for Membership, please let us know, and if not conflicting with another event, we will support it in person. We are getting busy, and that is good; supporting our veterans and their families is our mission. Remember, Veterans and Families do not have to be members of our Legion Family to receive support from our Veterans

VA & R

Service Officers; we are available. We also have oversight of our Department's VAVS Program and two of our team are VAVS Representatives. The VAVS program has representatives at our VA Facilities in Oregon, which all need more volunteers desperately. If you have some extra time and looking for a challenging volunteer assignment supporting Veterans, we need you. I know I am repeating this, it is important to our Veterans; with the closing of Compensation and Pension (C&P) activities in Roseburg and White City catchment areas with staffing issues and reassigning clinical staff to higher priority assignments, and moving patient needs to community care. Roseburg and White City catchment areas need volunteer drivers to transport Veterans to Portland VHA, Eugene VA, and C&P appointments. Roseburg and White City catchment areas have also been changing to CERNER, the new computer program supporting the VA, which has been challenged.

We have been requested by VA SORCC and NCA to hold a venue in the rural communities to support the new PACT activity. We have started adding the new PACT Act dialog to events that we are scheduling with VA Speakers. Thank you to all of you that continue to support our Veterans' community. Keep up the good work. Face mask requirements are easing in a lot of our areas, including the VA non-medical Buildings. The VAVS arm also supports the National Cemetery Administration (NCA) with activity at our National Cemeteries. We have additional responsibility at the VA SORCC and Eagle Point National Cemetery as we have more face-toface contact. The Commission also supports the System Worth Saving

Program and has supported four events in the past at our Roseburg and White City VAs with our National Organization.

And remember, Save the Date for the 2023 Women Veterans Conference, May 20 and 21, 2023. The event will be held at the Salem Convention Center/Grand Hotel. The Theme is "Stronger Together - Voices of Service". The Website is wvc.oregondva. com, and the contact at ODVA is Jessica Bradley, Women Veterans Program Coordinator. The event website is live, and you can sign-up for this important event. We have several Legionnaires interested in attending this event and are reserving rooms for the event. Please get the word out to all Women Veterans in Oregon, all 25,000 of them; this is an excellent event. We will be there and supporting this event.


















PDC, Jon Marsh PFC Member

WHEREAS, the American Legion Department of Oregon has experienced a significant decrease of membership since our last increase in 2006 from 20898 members to 13282 members, a 36.44% decrease; and

WHEREAS, this decrease in membership has resulted in a decrease in revenue in excess of \$100,000.00 per year while the cost of doing business has increased 48.4%; and

WHEREAS, with this decrease in revenue coupled with cost of inflation over the last 17 years that has since been absorbed by The American Legion Department of Oregon it has reached a point that Department will either have to reduce its programs or eliminate them entirely; and

WHEREAS, this resolution has been written and approved unanimously by the Membership and Post Activities Commission during a virtual meeting held March 15th, 2023, is now recommended to the Department of Oregon Convention for favorable action now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, by a majority vote, The American Legion Department of Oregon Convention assembled at the Mill Casino in North Bend Oregon raise the Department Per Capita from \$13.50 to \$18.50 an increase of \$5.00 in efforts to sustain funding of our office operations and our programs; and therefore, be it finally

RESOLVED, that upon approval by the Department Convention, this resolution be placed for effect beginning the 2025 membership year.

Center. Four of us attended and set up a table with brochures, miniature American flags, candy, and a "Welcome Home" handshake.

What is this Yellow Ribbon gig anyway? From our observational viewpoint, it was a well-put-together event to promote the well-being of National Guard and Reserve members, their families, and communities by connecting them with resources needed for reintegration following an overseas deployment.

Who was this for, you might ask? Our local National Guard unit, B3-116 CAV (AR) (Tank) had just returned from a year of deployment overseas.

We observed and heard that Saturday was a welcome sight for us old Viet Vets who received little to zero information about returning to civilian life once released from active duty. One of my long-time friends informed me of his experience. Upon arriving at Travis Air Force Base, he was processed one day and discharged the next with a pocket full of cash, his separation papers, and a bus ride to the San Francisco airport. "That's all, folks, and thanks for your service. Next!"

Vet News - Yellow Ribbon

The only thing I remember from my separation experience was what the chaplain said concerning our sometimes colorful language, "Gentlemen, remember, when you ask for the butter, don't describe it."

The Yellow Ribbon event was designed to mitigate a smooth transition from a year-long deployment in a foreign country to what seems to be a normal life upon returning home. Things change on the home front while service members are away. Siblings grow up, parents get older, and the old hometown also seems to change. If you're married and have kids, service members are in for a big surprise when they return home. Some children have never met the other parent or do not recognize them. There are emotional barriers to overcome as well.

Here is what the Yellow Ribbon event provided access to information on healthcare, education, employment, financial and legal benefits, counseling, job training, and resume enhancement.

Once again, I want to say to our returning vets of the National Guard unit, B3-116 CAV (AR) (Tank), "Thank you and Welcome Home," and please take advantage of the services mentioned above.

Now for a little info about Vet Help. There are many veterans looking for employment and need a helping hand from an employment specialist who will assist them in acquiring housing, drivers licenses, job training, and resume enhancement. For an employment specialist call, Vet Rep Oregon Employment Dept. 541-975-4519. They work with employers to get the vet a job, then get the vet ready to work.

Here is another number to call for employment assistance, "Work Source" at the Hermiston office, 541 567-3381.

Dear Editor:

The Children's Organ Transplant Association was founded in April 1986 when residents of Bloomington, Indiana, rallied around a toddler who needed a life-saving liver transplant. In less than eight weeks, the community raised more than \$100,000 to place the boy on the organ waiting list. Sadly, he died before an organ was found. Those community volunteers, along with his parents, turned tragedy into triumph by using the funds to help other transplant families. That was our beginning, and those volunteers were our first Miracle Makers.

For more than 35 years, thanks to the commitment of the men and women of The American Legion Family, we have assisted thousands of children and young adults by helping to raise funds for a lifetime of transplant-related expenses. Extensive volunteer networks across the nation are working to ensure that no child or young adult needing an organ or tissue transplant is excluded from a transplant waiting list due to lack of funds.

We need your help today to make sure that tragedies, like the one that was the catalyst in founding COTA, are not repeated.

The United States achieved a historic milestone in 2022 with one million transplants performed – more than any other country in the world. However, 17 people die each day in the United States waiting for an organ transplant. Another person is added to the nation's organ transplant waiting list every nine minutes. One organ donor can save eight lives. April is National Donate Life Month, and I am asking everyone within The American Legion Family to go to www.RegisterMe.org and register to be a designated organ and/or tissue donor.





American Legion Expects VA to Correct Housing Pay Snafu

WASHINGTON (March 31, 2023) – The head of the nation's largest veterans organization called on VA to assure student veterans who have been impacted by missed Post-9/11 GI Bill housing stipends today to "quickly make the situation right and assure veterans that it never occurs again."

"Veterans understand that when they fail in uniform, the only acceptable responses are 'no excuses!' and 'I'll correct it!' This is the type of response that The American Legion expects VA to offer all the students who were expecting their housing stipend today," said American Legion National Commander Vincent "Jim" Troiola. "Yesterday, a senior VA official assured us that their inspector general has been notified and the department is working to ensure that electronic payments reach veterans by Monday and checks are mailed out that same day. They are going to conduct a root cause analysis and contact schools to ensure that they are aware of what occurred. VA will also provide letters to veterans to share with creditors. These measures are a good start. The American Legion understands that when mistakes occur, it is the corrective response that is most important. The American Legion has always believed that VA has a responsibility to serve veterans as well as veterans have served this country. We expect VA to quickly correct whatever flawed process led to this error and ensure that veterans are not further inconvenienced by this delayed payment."
