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When we think about freedom, our minds usually go to freedoms that people had to fight and die for, like freedom of religion, speech, to bear arms, and so on.


So we are quick to respond in the affirmative when confronted with philosophical questions such as "are we really free?"

The right to free**dom** is a fundamental right that gives citizens basic freedom with respect to speech and expression, form associations, freedom of personal liberty, freedom to live a life of dignity, etc. The United States Constitution's First Amendment guarantees freedom of religion, freedom of speech, freedom of the press, the right to assemble, and the right to petition the government for a redress of grievances.

Department Finance Officer

Let's discuss our budget, specifically income versus expense, and budgets in general. There seems to be some confusion with some of our members who use the Department budget for their Legion activities. Our



Convention delegates adopt The approved Department Budget at each Department Convention for the new Membership Year. Considerable work goes into the Department Budget, initial budget requests by the officers, programs, and activities of the Department, which is a business. An initial Budget meeting with preparation, reviewing budget requests, and understanding income that will be available to support the new budget, which includes membership, which is our market, like any other business. The "market does dictate in any business." Unique, in our business, we do have pass-throughs and self-supporting programs, and some of those programs also have grants and other revenue streams. Those programs are co-mingled in our Department Budget as they are programs/parts of our Department. Income versus expense; our expenses cannot exceed our income. As we do each year, the Finance Commission will ask all officers, chairs of commissions and committees, and administration to submit their budget requirements in the next few months. Keep in mind as you meet with your team, plan your activity for our next membership year, and complete your budget request that if you have income, your expenses do not exceed your income. We have many years of actuals, income, and expenses, so we can provide you with this information. Far too many times, a program will list that their income is going to be \$50, \$70,000, and their actual income is \$9, 10,000, and their expenses are \$15, \$20,000. Remember, this is a business, and this is our business. One issue that we experienced this year is that a commission thought that the income number they submitted, which was adopted at Convention, even though they did not receive their projected income, they can spend it. NO. There is nothing wrong with planning for a larger program/event that is acceptable, encouraged, and supported. We must stay within our "actual" income line if it does not materialize. We have a lot of excellent programs; we are the only VSO with all these excellent programs. I would encourage officers, chairs of the Commission, and committee members to attend District and post meetings throughout our Department and provide information on their programs and become cheerleaders in all the great programs and activities that we do. And while out there, I get commitments and am sure a lot of interest in our programs and activities. There are a lot of grants in Oregon, and each chair should be applying for them for their program; we have a 501c3 that the grants can be held in for your program. And remember, we are a member organization; membership is our market, and the market dictates. Remember, we are here to help and answer questions, and there are no dumb questions. If you have not signed up for a mylegion account, you can go to the National site @ www.legion.org, click on Renew, and follow the same instructions. You will need your current membership number on your current card to complete the process.

I choose the online renewal process for several reasons:

Saves National from printing and mailing a renewal notice, then another if I don't respond, and the American Legion is saving money on paper, printing, and postage. We all need to do our part.

I can print a new membership card on the spot or pick it up from your Post. Renewing July 1st starts the climb to our end-of-year goal and makes the year easier on the Post Adjutants. Adjutants are busy and bogged down with paperwork, help them out.





SAL Commander Detachment of Oregon





Chaplains Pulpit

"God has made every thing beautiful for its

own time" (Ecclesiastes 3:11a NLT). Life is full of contrasts. We go through mountains, and we go through valleys. We go through successes, and we go through failures. We have wins, and we have losses.

In weather, there are four seasons. But in your life, there are dozens of different seasons. And every season of life includes both good and bad times.

Ecclesiastes 3:1-8 gives us a representation of different life experiences: "For everything there is a season, a time for every activity under heaven. A time to be born and a time to die. A time to plant and a time to harvest. A time to kill and a time to heal. A time to tear down and a time to build up. A time to cry and a time to laugh. A time to grieve and a time to dance. A time to scatter stones and a time to gather stones. A time to embrace and a time to turn away. A time to search and a time to quit searching. A time to keep and a time to throw away. A time to tear and a time to mend. A time to be quiet and a time to speak. A time to love and a time to hate. A time for war and a time for peace" (NLT).

Life is a combination of contrasting seasons. All sunshine and no rain make a desert. All actions have consequences, and that could be adversity. If you're following God's will, if you're trying to live your life according to the way God wants you to live, then you'll eventually see that these experiences can have purpose and value in your life.

You may think that the only time you're in God's will is when you're at church or having a quiet time. You can be in God's will as you're cleaning out a closet. You can be in God's will as you're mowing your



lawn. You can be in God's will when you move to a new location or stay right where you are. WE are in God's will all the time. There's a time and season for everything.

Ray Stevens sang a song called "Everything Is Beautiful" that included the lyric "Everything is beautiful in its own way." That's not exactly true. Everything is not beautiful. Cancer is not beautiful, some of us speak from experience. Child abuse is not beautiful. War is not beautiful.

The Bible says it differently in Ecclesiastes 3:11: "God has made everything beautiful for its own time" (NIV). That's very different from "Everything is beautiful in its own way." Because the Bible is saying that God can take even the bad things and, in the proper season, turn them around and use them for good in the way he intends.

You may be going through a season right now that is not beautiful. Your finances look ugly. Your health looks ugly. Your marriage or a friendship looks ugly. Your future looks ugly.

But God can make something good out of it as you trust him with the pieces.

WHAT IS CONSTITUTION DAY

Contrary to popular belief, the Fourth of July, or Independence Day, is not when the United States government was born. Instead, it was September 17, 1787, which is what we now celebrate as Constitution Day.

It has been 235 years since the Constitution was signed in the birthplace of our nation, Philadelphia. Since then, there have been over 11,000 proposed amendments to the document that guides our nation's government, but only 27 have been signed into law. The selectiveness of what goes into the laws of our country says a lot about the important of what was written in 1787.

The Constitution was signed by 39 of the 55 delegates at the Constitutional Congress, with only three refusing to sign as dissenters. The group of delegates originally met to revise the Articles of Confederation, but soon realized that it would be necessary to write an entirely new set of laws. The delegates debated over the course of four months in Philadelphia to put together the document, which spanned 4,543 words before amendments were added.

That's why, in 2004, September 17th was declared Constitution Day in the United States of America. It marks the day that our founding fathers signed the document that still dictates how we live today.

The idea of Constitution Day was a long time in the making.

New York City news giant William Randolph Hearst suggested the creation of a holiday to celebrate American citizenship as early as 1939. In 1940, Hearst used his powers to get Congress to sign a bill into law establishing the third Sunday in May as "I am an American Day," which was the first iteration of Constitution Day. On February 29, 1952, Congress moved the "I am an American Day" to September 17 and called it "Citizenship Day."

That same year, Louisville, Ohio Mayor Gerald A. Romary proclaimed September 17 as Constitution Day in the city thanks to a petition of resident Olga T. Weber. Weber did not stop there, though. She went to the Ohio General Assembly to have the day signed into Ohio State law, which it was. Weber continued up the ladder to the United States Senate and passed a resolution naming September 17–23 as Constitution Week, which President Dwight Eisenhower signed into law.

From its earliest forms to becoming Constitution Day, the sentiment behind the holiday remains the same: in celebration of our great country and the men who took the lead in establishing us as an independent, sovereign nation. According to Constitutionfacts.com, "Constitution Day, along with Independence Day and Presidents' Day, is an important part of the cultural heritage of the United States of America, because it recognizes the value of the American experiment, and the success of a nation of free people whose rights and liberties are protected by a written Constitution."

There will never be a document more important written in this country and we should celebrate it as what brought us all together under one flag, one nation.







Permanent Finance Commission

As a member of the Permanent Finance Commission, I have to tell you that last year was a trying year — and I'm worried. I'm concerned that we will

have more difficult choices in the coming year. For those who attended Convention this year, they heard about the deteriorating finances of our Department.

Our membership is our primary revenue source to fund most of our programs and the staff at our headquarters. Since 2010 we have seen the membership go down by 8,000 members. In financial terms, that is a loss of \$104,000 to our budget. That loss has resulted in a reduction in the amount we have to fund our programs, and it has also resulted in a 40% reduction in our staffing at Department headquarters. We are now at a bare-bones level of staffing. We have had to reduce the number of people in the office, reduce the hours the office is open, scale down our equipment capabilities with which we do business, and take severe cuts to fund many of our programs like Americanism.

This last year we asked for donations to help but only received approximately 25% of the needed funds. So, we had to take the next step, and that was a resolution at Convention to raise our dues. But, even that will not be enough because it only partially covers our costs and doesn't take effect until next year (2024-2025 membership year).


So what can we do now? <u>A simple solution is to raise our member-</u><u>ship</u>. According to the recent census and the Veterans Administration, there are approximately 261,000 veterans in Oregon. And since we have only 12,489 members, our organization only has 4.8% of that veteran population. If we could each reach out and recruit one new member, we could double our membership and have the additional revenue to restore many of the funding resources we lost in the last ten years. Is that too much to ask — recruit one new member this next year? Indeed, we can ask if people are veterans and tell them about the critical programs our post administers to benefit our communities.

So, let's carry a membership application in our wallets and a Why You Should Belong pamphlet in our cars (or on our person) and engage with community members to get them to know about us and all we do.

Memorial Day, Unity, and Community


Memorial Day is a day to honor and mourn the military personnel who died while serving in the military. On May 29, 2023, the Legion and Auxiliary of Washington Post 2 Forest Grove, Oregon, collaborated with the community to honor the fallen and recognize community resources in support of Veterans.

The event began with a parade of Colors by TAL, ALA, and Scout Troop 2060 and 213. Layne Teague, Post Commander, and Sheri Russell, Auxiliary President, lead the parade. The Neil Armstrong Middle School Choir, directed by Anna Elliott, sang the National Anthem. The 142_{nd} Fighter Wing of the Oregon Air National Guard conducted a flyover with two F-15 aircraft.

Each year Washington Post 2 pays tribute to one of their past Legion members. This year Wendy Berger-Wood researched and selected Ray Williams. Ray was born near Forest Grove and graduated from Forest Grove High School. He joined the Army National Guard, 41st Infantry Division in Hillsboro. On September 16, 1940, Ray entered Active Service. He was mobilized for 12 months of training, but Congress extended that time to 30 months and then to "Duration of War" after the attack on Pearl Harbor.

Ray and his comrades of 1st Battalion, 186th Regiment, 41st Division deployed to the South





After returning to Forest Grove, Ray went on to earn a master's degree from Western Oregon University and a Ph.D. from Portland State University. Ray became the principal of Gales Creek School, where he taught classes and drove the school bus. Ray received his certificate for 50 years in The American Legion on April 19, 2012. Ray died on April 7, 2018, at the age of ninety-seven.

The Army reorganized the 41_{st} Infantry Division to the 41_{st} Enhanced Infantry Brigade (EIB), headquartered in Oregon in 1965, and later to the 41_{st} Infantry Bri



gade Combat Team (IBCT). The 2_{nd} Battalion 218_{th} Field Artillery of the 41_{st} IBCT continues to serve in Forest Grove. Following the Honor Flag ceremony Lt. Col. Manual A. Robledo, Commander of the 2-218 FA, provided keynote remarks. Lt. Col. Robledo commented on the toll deployments take on service members and the need to eliminate the stigma of depression and the impact it has on the military.

The Post and Auxiliary laid a wreath at the Forest View Cemetery obelisk and returned the flag to full staff while the Neil Armstrong Choir sang "God Bless America."



Legion Family members urged to raise 'Be The One' awareness at the start of each month

During Day 1 of The American Legion National Executive Committee's Spring Meetings, the organization's governing body approved a new method for raising awareness of the Legion's "Be the One" veteran suicideprevention initiative. The NEC passed Resolution 13: Be the One Days. The resolution urges American Legion Family members and American Legion posts to – on the first of each month, starting this June – set aside that day as an opportunity to reduce the stigma around mental health issues. Legion Family members are urged to wear a "Be the One" item to signal their commitment to the initiative.

"We believe it will take a little bit of time to get this off the ground," said American Legion Marketing Commission Chairman Paul Evenson. "But once it spreads widely across the Legion Family, it will be a great way to keep the awareness high about this important issue all year long."

During Evenson's remarks, Kim Meesters – Brand Strategy and Innovation Director in the Legion's Marketing Division – shared the story of a servicemember who approached national staff during an event earlier this year and said he had contemplated suicide, at one time having a weapon in his hand to do so. He was immediately connected with an American Legion service officer.

"Not only did they quickly get him some companionship and some compassion and tell him they would help, but within 24 hours the gentleman had the appointments he needed, the right caretakers to help him (and) he had been connected with a (Legion) post," Meesters said. "How do we measure success with ('Be the One')? We measure it if we save one life. It means all of this is **worth it.**"



NEVER FORGET THE FALL OF AFGHANISTAN NATIONAL COMMANDER'S MESSAGE

Dear American Legion Family members and friends, It was two years ago when we were collectively dismayed at how swiftly the Taliban reasserted control over Afghanistan. Once the withdrawal of American troops gained momentum, we only knew it was a matter of time. Still the speed of the Taliban takeover unleashed anger, frustration and concern for Afghanistan interpreters and other allies who risked their lives to help U.S. troops during the 20-year war. Predictably, Taliban rule has plunged Afghanistan into a floundering economic state where human rights are compromised, malnutrition is rampant and education is shoved aside. And our allies' lives remain in danger. As veterans we understand what it means to say, "No one gets left behind." For two decades, our troops fought shoulder-to-shoulder with trusted Afghan allies who served as translators, protected troops from harm and fought for freedom. And to this day, the brave Afghan women who undertook missions with Green Berets and Navy Seals as Female Tactical Platoons have Taliban bounties on their heads. We must continue our two-fold fight for them. The United States must honor its promises and provide lasting protection for Afghans who have safely resettled in America as well as those who were left behind. The American Legion is urging Congress to pass the Afghan Adjustment Act, which would allow Afghans who fought alongside our service members the opportunity to apply for permanent legal residency after undergoing additional vetting. The English word "patriot" derived from "compatriot," in the 1590s, from Middle French patriote in the 15th century. The French word's compatriote and patriote ori ginated directly from Late Latin *patriota* "fellow-countryman" in century. the 6th From Greek patriotes "fellow countryman," from patrios "of one's fathers," patris "fatherland." The term patriot was "applied to barbarians who were perceived to be either uncivilized or primitive and who had only a common Patris or fatherland." The original European meaning of patriots applied to anyone who was a fellow countryman regardless of the socio-economic status.
